**"How Great Thou Art"
"The Old Rugged Cross"
Tie For Top Hymn Honors**

"How Great Thou Art" and "The Old Rugged Cross" tied for the first place in the National Newspaper Hymn Poll conducted by The Jeffersonian for its readers. Each hymn received 12 votes.

Second favorite hymn was "What A Friend We Have In Jesus," with three ballots.

Third place in the hymn poll was also a tie — between "Beyond The Sunset" and "In The Garden."

A total of 50 Jeffersonian readers voted in the hymn poll which ended October 10.

More than 61,000 newspaper readers from coast to coast voted in the National Newspaper Hymn Poll and 10,482 of them chose "The Old Rugged Cross," a vivid hymn which describes the traditional meaning of the Cross, as their dearest religious song.

Bill McVey, the Christian Herald gospel singer, who directed the survey to determine the hymns America loves best, and Audience Analysts, Inc., Bala-Cynwyd, Pa., the independent research organization which tabulated votes from readers of more than 1,000 newspapers, reported that "How Great Thou Art" was a close second to "The Old Rugged Cross."

"How Great Thou Art," a dynamic gospel song describing God's omnipotence, received 8,449 votes. Audience Analysts said this large vote doubtless was due to the song's popularity at hymn sings across the country. "How Great Thou Art," a favorite selection of baritone McVey and Billy Graham, was fourth in last year's Christian Herald hymn poll and McVey attributed part of its current popularity to its moving evangelistic feeling and strong melody.

The third favorite hymn disclosed by the National Newspapers Hymn Poll was "What A Friend We Have In Jesus," a song which has earned a place in Americans' hearts by its warm expression of faith held by Protestants of every denomination, McVey said.

Mr. McVey, who has sung all the top 50 hymns at Christian Herald Community Hymn Sings across the country, reported that "In the Garden," a hymn which

THE TEMPLES OF CORINTH

Corinth was a celebrated city of the Peloponnesus, and a great commercial center; commanding the traffic of both the eastern and western seas. The Phoenicians were the first to settle here and they left behind them many traces of their civilization, such as, dyeing and weaving. The Corinthian people were great in arts, but not a single Corinthian distinguished himself in literature. They were proud of their inventiveness in the artistic field, and their city became famous for the Corinthian order of architecture. They embellished their city and temples in beautiful ornamentation as no others had, even surpassing their sister Greek City of Athens.

The religion was built around a myth which included a countless line of deities, such as the cult of Aphrodite, Athene and Zeus or Jupiter which is the Latin equivalent of

the Greek Zeus, the highest god of the Greek Pantheon. The city was destroyed in 146 B.C. and rebuilt by the Romans in B.C. 46, after which it was a strong Roman colony. Pauls converts in Corinth were largely of the Latin descent, which explains the Latin names used in Paul's New Testament writings.

Corinth was a very corrupt city, a place of heathen temples, and idolatrous worship. At the North of the city a hill rise abruptly and soars some fifteen hundred feet above the level of the city. Here a thousand priests practiced religious prostitution. For this reason Paul, in his letter to the Corinthians stated that the body was the temple of the Holy Ghost, and should not be given to harlots.

The tall columns shown here are a few of the remains of the temples that is believed to have been standing in the time of the Apostle Paul.
