**American Red Cross Meeting; Jenkins Chapter**

A meeting of the Jenkins Chapter of the American Red Cross was held in the Assembly Room of the Office building Monday evening, May 29th at 7:30.

As the vacancy created by resignation of Mr. J. S. Farinash, Chairman, had not been filled and in the absence of Mrs. Steve Varson, vice-chairman, Mr. E. J. Berlin, treasurer, called the meeting to order. Mr. Berlin explained to the meeting how heavy the work had become since the war, that Mr. Farinash's place had not been filled and that it was necessary to hold this meeting for the purpose of reorganizing and that this meeting was known as the annual meeting of the Jenkins Chapter of the American Red Cross. He then introduced Miss Naomi M. Calvert, Field Representative from the Eastern Area, Alexandria, Va.

Miss Calvert stated that she was happy to see so many present and so interested in the Red Cross work. She then congratulated the Chapter on the splendid work done in the

War Fund Campaign—then she explained that the purpose of the meeting was to elect a chairman, a vice-chairman, recording-secretary and a treasurer.

Miss Calvert discussed the duties of the chairman and named the different committees:

- Home Service Committee.
- Disaster Preparedness and Relief Committee.
- Home Nursing Activities Committee.
- First Aid Committee.
- Voluntary Special Service Committee.
- Nutrition Committee.
- Junior Red Cross Committee.
- Public Information Committee.
- Membership and Fund Raising Committee.
- Finance Committee.
- Election of Officers:

The name of J. S. Hale was read by Miss Calvert as having been submitted by the nominating Committee for Chairman. She asked for other nominations and J. Bryan Boggs' name was given. Messrs. Hale and Boggs were asked to leave the room and the vote was taken, Mr. Hale receiving 44 votes and Mr. Boggs 27. Mr. Hale was then declared elected Chairman and asked to take charge of the meeting.

Mrs. S. J. Chewning's name was presented by the nominating committee for vice-chairman and there being no other nominations, was elected in the usual manner.

Mr. E. J. Berlin's name was presented for re-election as Treasurer and there being no other nominations, was elected.

Mrs. Opal McClellan's name was presented for Recording Secretary and with no other nominations was elected.

Chairman Hale then stated that the Executive Committee would be appointed and that he would like to have some from McRoberts, Dunham, Burdine, East Jenkins and Jenkins, in order that each community might be represented, and that in due season we would be notified of those men appointed to serve on the committees.

Mr. Berlin explained that an Executive Secretary was needed in this area. It was decided to allow the Executive Board to employ an Executive Secretary. Mr. Berlin then gave the treasurer's report. Contributions for 1944, \$6028. Balance on hand April 30th, \$6,187.28.

There being no other business the meeting adjourned.
