

COTTON SEED FEED MEAL is a misnomer.

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OAT FEED is a misnomer unless applied to whole ground oats.

FLAX FEED is a misnomer unless applied to whole ground flax seed.

FLAX BRAN is a misnomer.

OAT NUBBINS is a misnomer.

BUCKWHEAT FEED, consisting of buckwheat middlings and hulls, is a misnomer.

GLUTEN FEED as applied to distillers' grains is a misnomer.

6. What Has Been Accomplished.

The results of our inspection show conclusively that the purpose of the law is being accomplished. It is evident there is a very general understanding in the trade, both wholesale and retail, relative to the requirements of the law regulating the sale of feeding stuffs and an evident desire on their part to conform. On the other hand, the consumer is becoming educated in the subject of feeding stuffs and is now purchasing his feeds on the basis of their feeding value rather than at so much per ton. Feed heretofore sold as middlings, bran, shorts, and shipstuff, containing a large percent of corn bran, screenings, sweepings, and other forms of adulteration, are now sold to the consumer for what they are, and not as pure articles of feed. Such adulterants as cotton seed hulls, oat hulls, cob meal, peanut hulls, and like materials, so largely used prior to our law, are practically eliminated from the Kentucky market, except where they are used in compounded feeds by a few manufacturers. But in all such cases, the names and percentages of these adulterants are given in the certificate of registration and printed on the labels. The sale of inferior feeding stuffs has been greatly decreased, and in some cases such feeds have been withdrawn from the State. The intelligent consumer is now purchasing those feeds which contain
