The City Clerk reported that he had turned over the City Tax Book

for the present year to G. L. Carpenter, City Marshal, showing total amount of tax to be (\$8357.14) Eight Thousand Three Hundred Fifty-seven and 14-100 Dollars, and that he holds said Carpenter's receipt for same.

On motion the foregoing reports were received, ordered spread upon the records and filed.

Mr. S. L. Dodds, representing the Hickman Hdw. Co., appeared before the Council and requested the the Council put in a new iron and plate glass front in the City Hall building now occupied by them. Whereupon, on motion, the following agreement was entered into, to-wit: The Council agreeing to expend an amount not exceeding \$1000 in way of new front, repairs, etc., the said Hickman Hdw. Co. agreeing to advance all the money with which to do said repairs, at 8 per cent per annum, and to take credit for said advance and interest with the rents on the said property accruing immediately following the completion of said improvements and repairs. And in consideration of the improvements, the Hickman Hdw. Co. agrees to pay \$500 per year rent, payable quarterly, for said two store rooms of the City Hall building until the amount advanced by them is paid them in way of rent.

On motion, the Council instructed the Clerk to issue notices and have the Marshal serve same on W. A. Dodds, estate of A. A. Faris, J. W. Ward and Stephen Stahr, giving them ten days to build new brick sidewalks abutting on their property on east side of Kentucky street, in Hickman, Ky.

The Hickman Realty Co. presented an account for \$49.05 for filling in and repairing Fulton and Catlett streets at their intersection, and on motion, same was approved. W. A. Dodds also presented an account for \$53.18 for filling in and repairing Brooklyn and Hall streets at their intersection and on motion same was approved. And as per agreement heretofore made with these parties, the Clerk was instructed to give them the City's due bill for said amounts, payable out of the taxes on their property abutting the streets

where said improvements were made.

On motion Council adjourned.

SPECIAL TRAIN TO U. C. V. REUNION AT RICHMOND.

Troop A and Company B Confederate Veterans have selected the N. C. & St. L. Ry. and S. A. L. Ry. Via. Atlanta as their Official Route to the Richmond Reunion and arrangements have been made for a Special Train of Pullman Standard and Tourist Sleepers, Comfortable Day Coaches and Baggage Car to run through to Richmond. The change in date of departure to the 27th was made so as to take in the Jamestown Exposition before the Reunion. Special Train will arrive Richmond Tuesday afternoon, and early Wednesday morning. The regular May term of the Fulton Circuit Court is in session at the Court House, Judge R. J. Bugg on the bench and Commonwealth's attorney W. H. Hester prosecuting. The grand jury was empaneled Monday and the petit jury Tuesday. The grand jury has been busy, as evidenced by the indictments returned.
