Women Drinking More Now Than Ever Statistics Show

Women are drinking more now than ever before. And the percentage of alcoholics among them is increasing even more rapidly than it is among men.

Especially among older women drinkers is the problem of eventual alcoholism liable to become acute, according to an article "Why Some Women Should Not Drink" by Maxine Davis, noted medical reporter, in the September issue of Cosmopolitan magazine.

Two years ago the Yale Plan Clinics (for alcoholics) reported that the percentage of men to women among their patients was five to one. Last year Dr. D. B. Rothman of the Municipal Court of Chicago stated that the one-third of the city's alcoholics were women.

"How this increase in women alcoholics affect the home and future of the country is shown by the fact that alcoholic women remain married only half as long, are separated six times as frequently and their divorce rate is 32 times that of comparable non-alcoholic women.

"The most conspicuous characteristic of women alcoholics is secret drinking," the article states in part. "Long before they are actually confirmed alcoholics, women often drink alone. The woman who is terrified of parties discovers that a pre-party drink helps her face an evening of gaiety and even enjoy it."

"Because of the many social taboos which force women to drink secretly, their descent into alcoholism is much faster than that of men.

"Women who have an alcoholic tendency become confirmed drunks in a comparatively short time," the article states, "it usually takes the average man ten or fifteen years

to develop into a full-fledged alcoholic, but a woman, as a result of her intensive solitary drinking, is likely to reach the ultimate stages of the disease in fewer years."

"Women who take up excessive drinking when they are older become alcoholics even more quickly than those who begin their drinking careers in their youth. They imbibe with such gusto that they skip a number of the stages—and years—through which younger women progress before they become confirmed inebriates."

Seven clear signs of danger for women drinkers are listed in the article as follows: (1) Drinking to obtain social ease or to overcome a feeling of inferiority. (2) Drinking to escape from worry or troubles. (3) Drinking to dispel the "blues." (4) Drinking when overtired to "brace up." (5) Need for a drink at definite times through the day. (6) Desire for a drink in the morning. (7) Drinking alone.
