The state school per capita for 1907-08 has been fixed at \$3.40, an increase of ten cents over last year, and the largest ever paid by the state.

### R. F. D. Carriers Wanted.

Postmaster R. E. Woods of Louisville has announced an examination on August 3 for a carrier on a new rural route to start from Parkland. So far there have been no entries for the examination, and Mr. Woods states that applicants for these positions are scarce, notwithstanding the fact that the compensation of carriers on rural routes was recently increased, the maximum salary being \$900 per year. There are now twenty-four rural routes in the county, and anyone successfully standing the examination on the above date is eligible to fill any vacancy that may occur within one year.
