CAPITAL Roundup

A state-wide compliance check of occupational licenses and coin-operated amusement or music vending machines is being made by field representatives of the Department of Revenue. Failure to secure a renewed license which was due July 1 is punishable by a 20 per cent penalty and a fine of \$25 to \$200.
Commissioner of Economic Security Vege E. Barnes defended terms of the 1952 lien law against property of public assistance recipients, claiming it had caused "thousands of needy parents to become needlessly confused and frightened."
Barnes told members of County Advisory groups in session here that the lien which the State obtains against the property of aged recipients is "inferior to expenses of the last illness, burial and costs of administration of an estate" and is only enforceable following death of the recipient.
