

taking. The adviser in general holds personal conferences with each advisee, and makes recommendations to the proper university official with reference to living conditions, class schedules, etc. A freshman may upon the recommendation of the adviser be permitted to carry above a normal academic load.

Sophomore and Upper Division Advisers. The Dean of the college appoints a professor in the department in which the student is doing his major work to act as the student's adviser. The adviser must approve the student's schedule of classes prior to the placement of the student in the various courses.

Probation Students. Students placed on academic probation by the Dean of the college are urged to utilize the services of the University Counseling Office. The parent is notified at the beginning of the probation period. During the semester the student is interviewed and every attempt is made to determine his difficulty. The attitude of the college toward probation students is that they need assistance and with the co-operation of the parents the college attempts to fulfill this need.

Courses. The College offers courses designed to meet the needs of various classes of students. They may be listed under the following heads:

1. General cultural courses with majors and concentration fields, leading to the degree of A.B. or B.S.
2. Professional courses leading to special degrees in industrial chemistry, in journalism, in music, and in medical technology.
3. Professional courses in which the general requirements for the A.B. and B.S. degrees are fulfilled.
4. Preprofessional courses meeting the requirements for admission to professional schools.
5. Combined courses, by means of which students may save a year or more in gaining both the A.B. or B.S. and a degree in law, medicine, dentistry, forestry, or engineering.
6. Graduate courses leading to the master's and the doctor's degrees in the graduate school.

Degrees. The College offers courses leading to the following degrees: Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Arts in Journalism, Bachelor of Science in Industrial Chemistry, Bachelor of Music, and Bachelor of Science in Medical Technology. In all cases the student is responsible for the meeting of the requirements for graduation.

THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ARTS

For the degree of Bachelor of Arts the student is required to gain a total of 128 credits (exclusive of the required physical education) and 256 points; that is, a standing of 2.0. With the required physical education, a student is required to complete 130 credits and 260 points. In the departments of Anatomy and Physiology, Ancient Languages, Anthropology, Art, Botany, Economics, Geology, Journalism, Modern Foreign Languages, Music, Philosophy, Physical Education, Psychology, Radio Arts, Social Work, and Zoology, he must pass a final comprehensive examination on his major subject. The Political Science department requires a senior thesis. A Topical Major is required to write a comprehensive paper in the senior year.
