Candidates for the forestry program should indicate to the Dean of the college that they wish to apply for the Liberal Arts-Forestry curriculum. Admission to the college is granted under the same conditions as for other curricula. At the end of the first semester of the third year the college will recommend qualified students for admission to the Duke School of Forestry. Each recommendation will be accompanied by the student's application for admission and a transcript of his academic record at the University of Kentucky. No application need be made to the School of Forestry prior to this time.

THE PREPARATION OF TEACHERS

AIR SCIENCE

The Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps

The University of Kentucky maintains a unit of the senior division of the Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps in conformity with the provisions of the National Defense Act of 1916, as amended.

Object. The object of the Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps is to provide systematic military training at civil educational institutions for the purpose of qualifying selected students of such institutions as reserve officers in the United States Air Force. This object is attained by employing methods which fit men physically, mentally, and morally for pursuits of peace as well as for duties as leaders in the defense forces of the nation in an emergency.

Educational Aim. The course of study is designed to give the student training which will be as valuable to him in his industrial or professional career as it would be should the nation call upon him to act as a leader in its defense forces.

General Policy. The policy adopted by the Department of the Air Force to carry out the provisions of the Act of Congress of June 3, 1916, as amended, is to qualify students for positions of leadership in time of national emergency and to inculcate in them a respect for lawful authority, and to teach the fundamentals of the military profession and air science.

The primary purpose of all training is the development of character, leadership, and good citizenship; character through high standards of honor and integrity, leadership through the acquisition and use of knowledge, good citizenship through the idea of service as the real measurement of accomplishment and success.

The Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps curriculum is applicable to all students regardless of their field of academic study and is designed to produce junior officers possessing qualities and attributes essential to their progressive development in the Air Force Reserve and the Air National Guard.

Air Science courses are open to women students with approval of academic advisors and college deans concerned.
