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THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Copies of the biennial report of President Frank L. McVey to the Governor of Kentucky and the members of the General Assembly of Kentucky have been mailed to every active and interested member of the Alumni Association of the University of Kentucky. The report contains much that we wish to call your attention to. In the past two years the University of Kentucky has made a great deal of progress. There has been a marked increase in the student body and the services that the university offers to the state at large have been materially increased and improved. The president has set forth this growth and improvement in his report. He also has set forth some of the greatest needs of the university. The most pressing need is new class room buildings. There have been no new class room buildings built at the University of Kentucky for a great many years. During this time there has been an increase in the student body of hundreds. In other words the same space that was crowded for less than 1,000 students now is being used to take care of more than 2,500. The university has been most unfortunate in its attempts to obtain money for new buildings and improvements.

Within the past four or five years hundreds of thousands of dollars have been appropriated to build buildings on the campuses of the different State-maintained schools and colleges. The university did not receive its proportionate part of the money. In fact we received none of it. This year a strenuous effort is being made to obtain a modest appropriation for some new buildings. These buildings are needed more than is realized by any but those closely associated with the university.

It remains for us, the alumni of the University of Kentucky, to get behind this movement for more money for the University of Kentucky. A concerted effort on the part of a large number of Alumni would make this possible. A clear understanding of the needs of the university by the Alumni and friends is the first requisite in pushing the cause of our Alma Mater. For this reason we urge you to read this report which has been carefully prepared by President McVey. Acquaint yourselves with what is needed and what we are asking; then use every bit of influence with the representative or senator from your district, or the district from which you came, explain what the University of Kentucky is doing for Kentucky and how increased buildings and facilities would increase the services to the state. The university should be the greatest university in the South. It can be made such if we can bring about a full and complete understanding of what it does. A little effort will go a long way toward bring about that understanding.

ALUMNUS HEADS ENGINEERS' CLUB

Prof. Alexander Lewis Jenkins 1904, is Elected President of Cincinnati Professional Organization.

Prof. Alexander Lewis Jenkins, B. M. E. 1904, recently was elected president of the Engineers' Club of Cincinnati, according to an article in the Engineers' Club bulletin which was sent to this office by Dean F. Paul Anderson of the College of Engineering. Following is the story that was run in the club publication.

A. L. Jenkins Greetings to our new president Prof. A. L. Jenkins: A. Lewis Jenkins, professor of mechanical engineering, College of Engineering and Commerce, University of Cincinnati is known throughout America as Europe for his researches on machine tools and the design of heavy machinery. His publication on the analysis of combined stress and their application to the practical design of machine tools, hydraulic presses, punching and shearing machinery, are widely quoted in textbooks and engineering literature.

He was first to develop and publish an accurate method, based on experimental data for the determination of the stress distribution in pressed and shrunk fits such as are used in the assembly of large cranks, shafts, car wheels, locomotive tire

and crossheads. His researches on the rational determination of speeds, feeds and proportions of machine elements, have done much toward substituting exact and scientific knowledge for "rule of thumb methods" in design, construction and operation of many types of machines. Professor Jenkins was among the first in this country to develop courses of instruction in the graphical representation of mathematical relations used in engineering computation, and his work on slide rules, graphical charts and empirical formulas has been highly commended by engineers, educators and the many students who have taken his lectures. Professor Jenkins is a Kentuckian by birth, a graduate of the Kentucky State University, and also of the University of Cincinnati. Before coming to Cincinnati he was engineer at the municipal pumping and power plant at Jackson, Tenn. He has had practical experience on the design, testing and erection of machinery. It has been his aim during his 19 years of service at the university to develop methods of teaching and courses of instruction in mechanical engineering subjects which are especially adapted to take advantage of the exceptional pedagogical possibilities offered by Dean Schneider's cooperative plan of education. His first mechanical experience was with agricultural machinery. After graduation from college, he installed and operated power machinery at Pikeville, Ky., and Jackson, Tenn. He was later employed as designer of heavy hydrostatic machinery. He has degrees in mechanical engineering from Kentucky State University and the University of Cincinnati. He took post graduate work in the Graduate School of the University of Cincinnati and Columbia University. He has held the position of professor of mechanical engineering at the University of Cincinnati for the past ten years. In 1924 he was granted leave of absence for one year and taught at Robert College, Constantinople. He is a member of the A. S. M. E., I. P. E. E., and A. A. U. P. He has been director of the Cincinnati Automobile Club; and chairman, Cincinnati section A. S. M. E. At the present time he is secretary of the Cincinnati section A. S. M. E. "Prof." as he is familiarly known, is esteemed by all those who know him intimately. His "boys" at the Engineering College on the hill swear by him and not at him. His affable disposition, knowledge of engineering affairs and keen insight and interest in the Engineers' Club make him an ideal prexy to lead the Engineers' Club to greater achievements.
